**Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz** asked for an explanation in regard to Council Correspondence, a letter dated 9/16/20, from the Department of Commerce, Division of Liquor Control, re: Permits to Sell Alcohol Beverages Expire on 12/1/20. **Finance Director Brichacek** stated periodically the City receives 35% of registration fees when liquor license holders renew their permits. The money is collected by the State Department of Liquor Control and then by state law 35% is shared back to the local community.

## MAYOR'S REPORT (Audio: 6:14-13:55)

### Mayor Gardner reported:

- **COVID-19** update: Currently at 105 cases in the City, which is an increase of one case since our last meeting. To all the citizens and residents of Willoughby Hills, “Keep it up”!
- Continues to urge all residents to follow the Health Department suggestions and guidelines for safety and the safety of others and to help stop the spread of the virus in the City.
- September 30, 2020 is the deadline for our apartment grants and business grants. Council Vice President Kline and Councilman Zegarac will update the group on the progress of the Grant Program.
- Would like to appoint a Charter Review Commission after the first meeting in November.
- Charter Review Commissions serve until the next November election. If Council has any suggestions, please submit their name.
- Street Rehab Program going well for Evergreen Drive, Beech Hills Drive and Graylock Drive.
- Work on the Rockefeller Road Project is expected to start on Wednesday, September 30, 2020.
- City Engineer DiFranco has recommended accepting a bid for the Corp 90 Force Main Project; should have legislation to present to Council by the next meeting.
- Would like to recognize Road Superintendent Mark Grubiss and the Service Department for their excellent work in removing the City’s last underground storage tank. Their performing some of the work saved the City money. All testing was cleared; no leaks were detected. The tank was replaced with an aboveground tank which has a secondary containment system.
- The Service Department is preparing for leaf pickup season. Please rake leaves to end of the curb or as close as you can.
- Reminder for those residents that have yard waste pickup with Republic, it will continue to be picked up through the end of November.
- Continuing to make progress on the Police Substation. The Detective Bureau will be able to start operating there in the next couple weeks.
- General Reminders:

#### **LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT (Audio: 16:18-19:17)**

##### **Law Director Lucas reported:**

- Received an inquiry regarding the City's position on deer bow hunting within the city boundaries.
- Presently, deer bow hunting is not permitted.
- The Law Department has been asked to look into the matter.
- Law Director Lucas will be responding to the resident that made the inquiry regarding his analysis.

#### **Questions/comments following Law Director's Report: (Audio: 17:18 -19:45)**

**Councilwoman Fellows** stated the question of deer hunting is not something new in Willoughby Hills but it is new to this Council. The former Council had a pretty intensive research done on it; but it has been a few years. They had a meeting with a representative from the Ohio Department of Recreation, a representative from the Metro Parks and Chief Collins. A lot of the areas around City Hall are one acre lots and issues may arise with neighbor disputes regarding deer hunting. We have to keep in mind there is a major river and a major Metro Park that runs through the City. Most residents may not know that the Metro Parks cull deer in our section of the park in Willoughby Hills. The Police Department is aware they do it at night. Sharpshooters are used and the deer goes for venison for the Soup Kitchens. Some years ago, Chief Collins had indicated that most of the deer were hit on the Interstate and not in residential areas. It is more of a nuisance issue than a safety issue.

## **FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT (Audio: 19:46-21:27)**

### **Finance Director Brichacek reported:**

- The draft of the Coronavirus Relief Fund Budget was distributed to Council.
- Update on revenue: The good news is income tax revenue has picked up.
- At the end of September, we are only \$57,000 behind September 2019.
- On a budget basis that would be about \$145,400 behind what was budgeted to that point of time.
- One area of concern is Court revenue; it is down significantly. The projection is it will be down between \$250,000 - \$350,000 of what was collected.
- The pace in which revenue is being collected should be similar to the total that was collected 2018.
- The Property tax collection looks good.
- The other area of significant change, it looks like the gas tax is going to be down about \$110,000.
- The motor vehicle license fees are going to down about \$17,000.
- The motor vehicle license fees might be a timing difference; during the shut down the State was not registering cars.

## **CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT (Audio: 21:35-24:04)**

### **City Engineer DiFranco reported:**

- As the Mayor mentioned, the Street Rehab Pprogram is finishing up on Evergreen Drive, Beech Hills Drive and Graylock Drive.
- The contractor will be returning next week to make some adjustments and install an aggregate berm along the edge of all the roadways.
- The aggregate berm is just intended to provide a transition between the asphalt and the grass surface. It is not intended to be driven on or walked upon. It is soft when it is installed and up to a foot wide.
- It solidifies over time, as it rains a couple of times it will solidify.
- We usually get a few calls from the residents because they see that it is soft when it is put down.
- The Sewer Rehab Program is ongoing, the contractor will be returning next week to clean and inspect a few more sections of sewer. In mid-October they will start the lining process on those sewers.
- Anticipate starting construction on Rockefeller Road on Wednesday, September 30, 2020.
- Bids were received on the Corp 90 Force Main Project. There were five bids, three of them were below our estimate and two were at or above our estimate.
- Our estimate was about \$305,000 and the low bid from DRS Enterprises, Inc., was at \$175,000.
- They are a well-known contractor in this area. They specialize in directional boring and own their own equipment which is why their bid was so low.

**Questions/comments following City Engineer's Report: (Audio: 24:05-26:10)**

**Council President Hallum** asked if Rockefeller Road would be shut down. **City Engineer DiFranco** stated traffic will be maintained at all times. They will block off just a section of one lane as needed and have flaggers letting people by. **Council President Hallum** asked if it would be done in the evening. **City Engineer DiFranco** stated it would be done during the day during normal business hours. **Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz** asked what the time frame was for the Corp 90 Force Main Project. **City Engineer DiFranco** stated they have not been given a start date yet because the contracts have not been signed. They feel they can have the project completed in about a month. So, depending on when they start, a month after that. **Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz** asked if there would be any disruption of traffic on the road if it is it all drilling. **City Engineer DiFranco** stated all the work is on the roadside. The project is mostly along the Metro Park property, so no residents will be affected. **Councilwoman Fellows** asked when will Mr. Belich's project on Chardon Road be completed. **City Engineer DiFranco** stated the last time he spoke to them they were aiming for the end of September.

**Councilman Taylor Draper** reported:

- The WHISPER Committee will be holding their first meeting in the next ten days.
- Encouraging everyone that would like to volunteer and help seniors in the community to go on to the website and apply. Background checks are required. You cannot just show up.

**PC-ABR: (Audio: 27:09-29:11)**

**Councilwoman Taylor Draper** reported on the **Architectural Board of Review & Planning and Zoning:**

- Last week's meeting was cancelled and instead Developers Scott Scheel and Ray Somich were invited to discuss ideas, plans, goals, and direction with the Master Plan Subcommittee.
- Mr. Scheel is willing and able to work with Council. He is urging Council to have zoning flexibility.
- He is very interested in making something happen at Loehmann's Plaza.
- Mr. Scheel shared some of his ideas regarding COVID-19.
- The next Planning and Zoning meeting will be on October 1, 2020.

**Council Vice President Kline** stated in the final meeting in July when he was appointed Chair of the Business Subcommittee, he was to select two fellow Council members for the committee. The two members are Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz and Councilwoman Taylor Draper. In addition, Council Vice President would like input and help from all members of Council to effectively work with the businesses.

### **Economic Relief Program for Small Business: (Audio: 30:50-34:40)**

**Council Vice President Kline** reported:

- Making good progress, down to 5-6 days left to apply.
- We have 35 or more applications that have been received, some have been reviewed and some have been paid out.
- Most of the applications have been for the full amount of \$2000.
- We have a lot of unselfish businesses in Willoughby Hills.
- All businesses can apply even if it is for a small amount.
- Encouraging Council and the public to check with businesses to see if they have applied regardless of the amount.

**Councilman Zegarac** reported:

- We have somewhere in the mid-thirties range that have applied for the small business grants.
- Most of the businesses are deserving and really need the help.
- It is refreshing to go out and meet with and get to know them.
- It was good to talk to some of them and understand their circumstances.
- We expect to finish the program strong.
- We have about ten more businesses to concentrate on in the next couple of days.
- The program ends on September 30, 2020.
- Believe we are in the 80% range, would like to get to the 100 % of the \$100,000 if we can.

**Council President Hallum** thanked Council Vice President Kline and Councilman Zegarac.

**Council President Hallum** stated there are cities around us that are just now starting to put this stuff up. Thanks to Councilman Zegarac who was very vocal about jumping on this so quickly. We acted very quickly, and other cities are utilizing what we did to help their businesses. Thank you to everyone for being willing to act.

**Councilwoman Fellows** stated she was happy that Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz suggested there be more diversity over the City and the districts of the City for Commissions. The majority of the voters that year voted it down. **Council President Hallum** agreed with Councilwoman Fellows that it is helpful to have; but is glad that it is an option because if they do not get someone from every area, they can still do it.
