### MAYOR'S REPORT

By now, I am sure that many of you have noticed that the potholes on Route 91 (SOM Center Road) have been filled by our Service Department. The pavement markings will soon be done in this area as well. In 2016, we will be working with the City of Willoughby to complete this project by the resurfacing of Route 91 between Willoughby and Willoughby Hills. We had waited for the availability and acceptance of a grant to assist with the completion of this project.

We just completed resurfacing Pleasant Valley Road and a portion of Eddy Road that will certainly make travel much easier. As funds allow, we will continue our plan for resurfacing streets throughout the city.

Lake County Storm Water funding has made two big projects on Lamplight Lane and Eddy Road possible. We anticipate the completion of these projects shortly and then will be able to assess what additional projects can be accomplished with Lake County Storm Water funding. Information on these projects may be found on the City website.

Dunkin' Donuts will be opening during the second week of September. This may encourage the economic development of other business establishments in that area. We continue to work on getting new businesses, particularly on the west end of the city, in this troubled economy. Clover Development continues to work on the Willoughby Hills Senior Apartments. The projected completion date is spring 2016. The company has provided pamphlets on the apartment unit and complex. They are available at City Hall and contain all of the information you may need to be one of their first tenants!

We welcome Principal Brian Patrick and all students of the inaugural class of the Willoughby-Eastlake School of Innovation. It is nice to have some "life" back in the walls of the former Eaton Building on Chardon Road.

As our thoughts turn to school nearly back in session and half of 2015 gone, I want to reassure our residents that we continue to manage our budget and spending, provide for the needs of the Police, Fire and Service Departments, and keep "Residents First." Please remember to contact me at 440-946-6614 if you have any questions or concerns about any aspect of our City. I am pleased that we have kept Willoughby Hills out of the newspapers for the "wrong" things and plan to continue that mindset as we turn our calendars to 2016!

# SHARING CITY FINANCIAL INFORMATION WITH OUR RESIDENTS

This report is being provided to answer all questions relating to the City's Long-Term Debt which serves to pay for projects and equipment on a long-term basis. You can see by the following report which was prepared by our Finance Director Frank Brichacek, that approximately 84% of this long-term debt is related to what the City owes for the sanitary sewer system construction and improvements. The remaining (15.7%) is allocated to long-term debt that was incurred to fund the Community Center, Police & Fire Dispatch Center and radio equipment, Fire and Service Department vehicles, Fire Station improvements and street improvement projects in 2012 and 2013. I am pleased with the plan we have established to pay down on the debt annually. We are not borrowing frivolously; we have a plan to manage this prudently and are very transparent about what is outstanding to our residents. Finance Director Brichacek has prepared an outstanding overview (which has been on the City website since the budget was proposed earlier this year). I felt it was important to include this in a City Newsletter where all residents can view the information in black and white. ## FINANCIAL REPORT ON LONG-TERM DEBT

During 2015, the City of Willoughby Hills has continued to responsibly manage its long-term debt liability. On January 1, 2015 the City's total long term debt liability was \$13.62 million dollars. During 2015, the City will reduce its debt load by approximately \$877,000 (or 6.4% of the total), reducing its total long term debt liability to \$12.74 million. Here is a summary of the City's 2015 debt repayment plan:

It is important to note that before the City borrows any money, City Council must authorize the borrowing and review and authorize the City's plan to repay the proposed debt issue. Without City Council's approval of the issue and repayment plan, debt may not be issued.

**General Debt:** Includes all debt issued by the City for construction projects or property or equipment purchases not related to the sanitary sewer system. This debt category is financed by the general resources of the City. The General Debt category includes the debt financing the following:


- **Debt Issued Prior to December 31, 2007 (balance as of 1/1/15 - \$1.037 million):** Improvements to the City's fire station (issued in 2001), the acquisition of a fire truck (2005), the construction of the Community Center (2004) and a bridge maintenance project (2006).
- **Debt Issued Since January 1, 2008 (balance as of 1/1/15 - \$1.1 million):** The acquisition of a fire truck (2011), an ambulance (2015), a snow plow truck (2015), street improvement projects (2012 and 2013), renovation and equipping of the Police & Fire dispatch center (2008) and police radio equipment (2011). Three of the issues in this category will be paid in full in 2016 with the remainder being retired by 2023.
- **Sewer Debt:** Is comprised of 20 year loans issued to the City by the Ohio Water Development Authority and the Ohio Public Works Commission to finance the construction of and improvements to the City's sanitary sewer system. This debt category is funded by sewer user fees. Most of this work was mandated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency. These loans were issued at various times between 2003 and 2010 and will be retired between 2022 and 2031.

The detail of the City's long term debt is listed in Exhibit 9 of the City's 2015 Operating Budget Document. # CALLING ALL VOLUNTEERS!



## CHARTER REVIEW COMMISSION SENDING ITEMS TO THE NOVEMBER BALLOT

---

Two years of hard work by ten volunteer residents has finally come to a close, ending with sending items to the November ballot for all residents to vote on.

In 2014, Mayor Weger appointed nine individuals to review the current City Charter, which is the document that serves to outline the framework of the City. Mayor's actions were precipitated by resident and Council concerns about "Conflict of Interest" and "Nepotism". This pertains to Article IX of our Charter.

The nine-member group started their work, reviewing each chapter of the City Charter line by line. Unfortunately, November came too soon for this group and they could not prepare the items in time for the November 2014 ballot.

In January 2015, Mayor Weger re-appointed 8 of the 9 members to continue their work on the Commission. One member was not available for the 2015 term, so another resident volunteer took on the challenge. The Charter Review Commission met many, many times over the past year. They are now at a place where the Charter has been reviewed in its entirety. Eight or nine key issues have been identified that the Commission has chosen to put up to the voters.

I wish to acknowledge that during this time, our Civil Service Commission members (Thomas Majeski, Thomas Kicher and Carolyn Patton) did an extensive amount of work to present to the Charter Review Commission for consideration of Section 9.4 of our City Charter (Civil Service). Thanks to these three volunteer members for their input and assistance to the Charter Review Commission.

The Charter Review Commission will be holding two public hearings to discuss the ballot issues on Monday, Sept. 28, 2015 and Tuesday, Sept. 29, 2015, both at 7:00 p.m. at Willoughby Hills Community Center O'Ryan Room. They will be on hand to explain their proposals and answer any questions that the public may present. In addition, the Council Clerk is responsible for mailing out a sample of how the issues will look on the ballot.

We want to ensure that the residents understand the City Charter changes. If you are unable to make the meetings or have specific questions and would like further explanation, please do not hesitate to contact City Hall and we can put you in touch with the Chairman of the Charter Review Commission or our City Law Director.
