# LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT – Thomas G. Lobe

Reported on the Tabling of <u>Ordinance No. 2015-5</u> – an Ordinance establishing the position of Community Service Officer. Law Director Lobe stated that there were several attempts to meet with the Union Representative to further discuss the responsibilities of the CSO position, but these meetings have been cancelled.

#### FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT – Frank J. Brichacek, Jr.

Reported that the US Department of Labor has released the January Consumer Price Index for All Wage Earners and Clerical Workers in the Cleveland Akron Area today. The January 2015 CPI declined by 0.14% (to 208.542 from 208.829) from the January 2014 CPI.

In accordance with the requirements of Section 121.02 of the Codified Ordinances, the 2015 salaries of the Mayor, Council President and Members of Council will be decreased by .14% over the 2014 salary. In accordance with <u>Ordinance Nos. 2002-119 and 120</u>, the 2015 salaries of the Safety and Service Directors will also be decreased by 0.14% over the 2014 salary. These changes are retroactive to January 1<sup>st</sup>. These changes will be included in the March payroll, along with a retroactive adjustment for January and February 2015.

**President Somich** thanked the Finance Director and explained that it was a system that was put into effect a number of years ago that everyone here that you see, certainly all of Council and most of the key administrators of the City are tied-in to that Index, so if there is an increase, whatever the Government says it is, we receive and if there is a decrease, we also receive that. So that's the way it works when you follow that system.

**Councilwoman Fellows** stated that it would include all the non-union individuals that we just tied their raises to the CPI as well, correct? **The Mayor** replied that it is only Council and the Mayor. **Councilwoman Fellows** stated that it was a 1.12% increase granted to the non-union employees based on the CPI, so this did not affect them. The **Mayor** replied no and further stated that the non-union employees were not affected. He said that it was a 0.14% decrease for Council...**Councilwoman Fellows** replied no, that she was not asking that, and went on to say because we voted a couple meetings back to increase the wages of the non-union employees in the City and the number that was used for the was tied to the CPI, the rate of increase being 1.12%. So this doesn't affect them. The **Mayor** and the **Law Director Lobe** replied no.

**Councilwoman Fellows** inquired as to the recent liquor license for the building that use to be Baker Square. **Law Director** explained that the land owner Musca Properties, Inc was applying for the liquor license. The Building Commissioner is checking it out; there is a possibility that a Mexican Restaurant will be coming into the area.

# CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT – Pietro A. DiFranco, P.E.

Received bids for Knecht/O'Brien and Lamplight Culvert Projects. There was a lot of interest; we received 10 to 12 bids and we received several bids for each project that were below the Engineer's estimate. We are still reviewing the bids but should not have a problem finding a contractor for under the budget amount. Took a moment to say thank you to the City. Bowen and Associates, we have just completed two years. Dan, his assistant, is here in the audience. On behalf of Dan, himself and Bowen, we just wanted to say thank you. If the City should decide to approve Bowen + Associates for the next contract we are proposing to add an Assistant and he is seated next to Dan; his name is Kevin Trepal.

# COMMITTEE MEETING OF FEBRUARY 23, 2015

<u>Members Present</u>: President Raymond C. Somich, Chair, Councilman Christopher L. Biro <u>Also Present</u>: Councilman David M. Weger Purpose of the Meeting was to discuss <u>City Finances</u> and any other business.

Meeting convened at 6:03pm

#### Order of Business

The Chair explained that there will be at least two meetings to discuss the proposed 2015 Annual Budget. Having just received the materials today, he asked that the Finance Director (FD) to give an overview, especially accenting the changes from the 2014 Budget and 2014 final actual numbers.

The Finance Director FD explained how we will continue to run very lean in 2015. Annual revenues are projected to be relatively flat. Mayor's Court Revenue is projected to be down from 2014 Budget, but a little higher than 2014 actual. Mayor's Court Revenue is only on a cash basis, and does not count outstanding fines due to the City that have not been paid. We again looked at the reductions in funding from the state, which totaled \$1.7m in 2012 and is now \$1.1m in 2015. With wages being the largest expense, we discussed how the budget includes all union contract increases, as well as a 1% increase for non-union staff. The budget for wages is not that much different from the 2014 Budget, but it is much higher than 2014 actual amounts because a good portion of the 2014 Budget was not spent last year, helping to give the City a carryover last year. We are projecting a 20% increase in health care costs, and that does not include any ACA specific costs or penalties because this area is still unclear. Other major expense changes will be the increases in road salt, due to the much higher cost, and we have already appropriated funds for major street repairs, road striping and engineering in

2015 for the Route 91 Project scheduled for 2016. We again reviewed the previously approved purchases of new safety and service vehicles. After significant discussion and questions from Council, the Chair suggested that we all individually review the proposed budget, and either email the FD and all Council Members with questions, or bring questions to the next committee meeting (date not yet announced). The plan is that the budget will be read three times and put up to a vote at the Council Meeting of 3/26/15.

Councilman Biro and the Chair thanked the FD for the highly detailed reports and exhibits. The Chair also asked the Mayor for his input on the budget and the financial status of the City.

Legislation for the Council meeting of February 26, 2015:

<u>**Ordinance 2015-1**</u> – An Ordinance providing for the issuance and sale of not to exceed \$800,000 notes for the purpose of paying, but limited to the following:

- A portion of the costs of renovating, improving and equipping the City's existing fire and police communication center
- > Acquiring a fire truck
- Rebuilding and resurfacing various roads including Gatsby Lane and Hanna Road

This note will mature on March 12<sup>th</sup>.

The Rules and Legislation Committee recommended that this Ordinance be on 3<sup>rd</sup> Reading and Adopt.

<u>Ordinance 2015-4</u> – An Ordinance authorizing and directing the Mayor to enter into a contract agreement with Bowen Associates, for our City Engineer and Assistants. This new contract incorporates an additional Assistant and increases retainer fees. It was brought to the attention of the Committee that the rationale for two assistants in the contract is reflective of the current assistant training the new assistant for transitional purposes; so ultimately the City will be back to one assistant along with the Engineer. The Mayor said this was not the case, but acknowledged that he told Chair Fellows that it was. The Contract calls for 2 Assistant Engineers. Rules and Legislation recommend that this be on  $3^{rd}$  Reading and Adopt.

<u>Ordinance No. 2015-8</u> – Authorize the Mayor to accept the Limestone Bid presented by Osborn Concrete & Stone, as recommended by Mark Grubiss, Road Superintendent. *This is similar to the next legislation. Roads cannot be worked on with asphalt and limestone until the plant opens, later in March or early April. With the emergency tag, it will go into effect immediately upon passage, therefore the Committee recommended 1^{st} Reading.* 

<u>Ordinance No. 2015-9</u> – Authorize the Mayor to accept the Asphalt Bid presented by Osborne Concrete & Stone as recommended by Mark Grubiss, Road Superintendent. *See above*.

<u>Ordinance No. 2015-10</u> – 2015 Budget. Discussed in Finance Meeting prior to this meeting. Exhibit A is the actual budget will be attached.  $I^{st}$  Reading is recommended by this Committee.
