MAYOR'S REPORT (Audio: 21:17- 27:35)

Mayor Gardner reported that COVID-19 boosters would be available at the Willoughby Hills Community Center on Monday, April 25, 2022 with sign up through the ArmorVax program on the Lake County General Health District's website. The Mayor's Office will be happy to assist you if you need help in signing up for the booster.

First quarter report for the Police Department:

Calls in the first quarter = 4,124 (compared to 3,328 last year, first quarter)

Traffic or motor vehicle matters (including disabled vehicles, accidents, traffic complaints and traffic stops) = 1,497

Investigations of suspicious conditions, persons or vehicles = 82

Public assists/welfare checks (lockouts, other non-emergency) = 168

Mayor Gardner continued to state that we have kicked off our new speed sign program on both Route 91 and Maplegrove. One of the units is having some issues and is being looked at by the vendor. We are working out the best settings for sensitivity of the units. We are also ordering some additional batteries and brackets to be able to move these around the City more easily and avoid downtime when the batteries run down. These will be moved around quite a bit to cover as much of the City as possible.

Mayor Gardner stated that we received the report today from Gary Pratt, our representative to the Noise Abatement Council at the Cuyahoga County Airport. For the first quarter of the year, operations at the Airport were down significantly when compared to 2021 (4,141 vs. 5,437) with 41 VNA operations vs. 78 last year. Only five complaints were officially logged with the airport (all by one resident of another community). Last year, there were three. The Airport also acknowledged the complaints provided on February 22nd with respect to the unusually loud engine testing and on March 23rd with respect to the unusually loud volume of a power unit being used in an aircraft cleaning operation.

The Fire Department reminds everyone that open burning is a big risk this time of year. Please do not burn open fires outside, especially yard waste. Please take advantage of our yard waste program. Do not burn leaves, sticks, etc. If you have questions, please call Republic Services and they will let you know what is and is not permitted.

This is also the time of year when the City may receive a visit from a bear. Please stay away if you see a bear and let the Police Department know it is in the area.

The Service Department is busy with annual sewer cleaning and will be starting roadwork soon. Also, as a sure sign of spring, they will be starting to get the ballfields into condition for baseball. Soccer is already using the fields.

Thanks to all of Council, Karen, and Gloria - and special guests Pat Hopkins and Fire Chief Gandee - for putting on a great District 3 meeting for our residents last night.

Mayor Gardner wished a Happy Easter and Happy Passover to all!

Questions/comments following Mayor's Report (Audio 26:14 - 27:35):

Councilwoman Taylor Draper asked if there was a timeline concerning the Parking Lot Rehabilitation at City Hall.

Mayor Gardner responded that there are still plans to do it this summer. With the construction of the new Salt Storage Facility, the driveway may be deferred. There are plans to do it in concrete because the cost of asphalt is currently so high. The parking is still planning to happen this year. The driveway may have to wait until next year so the new concrete isn't put in only for the salt storage facility construction vehicles to come through and ruin it.

Council President Hallum made a suggestion to the Mayor to bring one of the Speed Sign units over to River Road as there have been resident requests. **Mayor Gardner** said that it's already in the works.

LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT (Audio: 27:37 – 29:05)

Law Director Lucas reported about the status of both pools in Willoughby opening this summer: It hasn't been decided as of yet. They are trying to stagger the hours of operation between Osborne and Euclid Avenue pools due to staffing issues. He will continue to update as he hears more.

Law Director Lucas discussed the antique tractor subject that came up at the Monday meeting in regards to Ordinance 2022-021. He stated that it is a vehicle. Because it's an antique vehicle it doesn't have to be operable so it's permissible. **Law Director Lucas** added that he'd like for Ordinance 2022-021 to remain on Third Reading as he has some minor revisions to make.

Questions/comments following Law Director's Report:

No questions/comments.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT (Audio: 29:07 – 42:48)

Finance Director Brichacek reported the closing of the bond issue and receiving the \$1.6 million wire transfer from Chase. The contract purchase order for the fire truck has been placed and it should be received in 440 days (June 2023). The Salt Storage Facility should be constructed and ready for the 2022-2023 winter season. He stated that a good team effort was made to lock in the interest rate as interest rates are rising.

Finance Director Brichacek also reported that the First Quarter expenditures are on target.

Finally, **Finance Director Brichacek** stated that the Police Department received a non-monetary donation of K9 vests from Wild Goose Control. In addition, a grant of \$1,000 from Lake County Visitor's Bureau was received for the City's Rock & Roll Day. This amount was matched by the Lake County Commissioner's Office for a total of \$2,000.

Questions/comments following Finance Director's Report (Audio 38:42 – 42:48):

Mayor Gardner added that the City has been put on a waitlist regarding a Body Camera Grant applied for last year. If received, the City could be reimbursed about 50% of the cost (about \$30,000).

Finance Director Brichacek added that the City's slope failure will cost roughly \$400,000. Lake County Watershed has agreed to finance the entire project. **Mayor Gardner** added as reference that the area is along Rogers Road adjacent to the river, which is where the stormwater comes from.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT (Audio: 42:32 – 53:55)

City Engineer DiFranco gave an update on the Salt Storage Facility project that is currently in the works. He gave additional information on the City Hall Parking Lot stating that there are a couple challenges, mainly logistics. They are trying to figure out the best way to schedule with the work happening at the Salt Storage Facility. In the parking lot, there will be relocated light poles (owned by CEI).

City Engineer DiFranco stated that he and Road Superintendent Mark Grubiss met with Tim Miller from Lake County Stormwater at the Rogers Road site to look at the slope failure (slippage). It's a difficult site as there's not much room to work, but they are looking at options for the best approach for repair.

City Engineer DiFranco added that he supports Sewer Rehab Ordinance 2022-024 for the United Survey bid acceptance. This will be the fourth year the City has worked with them. Their bid was 5% over the engineer's estimate.

City Engineer DiFranco added that he supports Street Rehab Ordinance 2022-025 for the Chagrin Valley Paving bid acceptance. Their bid was almost 23% higher than the engineer's estimate. This is due to the recent spike in oil and gas prices, which were unforeseen. There were five bids for the project and the top three were within \$500 of each other.

Questions/comments following City Engineer's Report (Audio: 47:26 – 53:55):

Councilwoman Belich asked **City Engineer DiFranco** to better explain the 22.9% overage (over 10% threshold) and why it should be approved. **City Engineer DiFranco** stated that because the City of Willoughby Hills has its' own Charter, this falls under Home Rule Charter Municipality and the City can waive the 10% requirement.

Law Director Lucas explained the 10% being waived if an emergency and that because of Chapter 117, the City can move beyond the 10%, as referenced in the Ordinance itself. There's a basis under the law to move beyond the 10%.

Councilwoman Belich asked if there would be any issues moving forward and if there has been issues in other cities. **Law Director Lucas** stated that there is a lot of consternation in the Ohio Municipal League for these very problems. Some are being addressed through home rule while others, in the absence of an emergency, they have to re-bid.

Councilwoman Belich asked **City Engineer DiFranco** if we needed to pass the Sewer Rehab Ordinance or would it be okay to leave on First Reading. **City Engineer DiFranco** responded that it can stay on First Reading but he'd like to see the Street Rehab Ordinance passed.

Finance Director Brichacek stated that before a purchase order can be issued to this project there would need to be an appropriation increase to the Road Levy Fund 270 in order for the Mayor to legally sign the contract.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (Audio: 53:58 – 1:06:07)

Recreation Commission Report by Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz (Audio 54:03 – 55:10):

Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz reported that the Recreation Commission will be holding their Spring Garage Sale on April 30th and the deadline to be listed in the directory is April 23rd. There was a pickleball subcommittee meeting held a couple of weeks ago. Those who have stepped forward have been a great help with their resources and ideas. They've helped the service department get the courts ready for the upcoming season. There was talk on forming leagues and holding tournaments in order to raise money and for promotion. The possibility of having youth leagues was brought up as well.

PC-ABR – reported by Councilwoman Taylor Draper (Audio: 56:38 -1:01:23):

Councilwoman Taylor Draper reported that the Planning Commission Architectural Board of Review convened on April 7th. There was a Public Hearing prior to the Planning Commission meeting for the Door Dash Essentials at 27565 Chardon Road. City codes don't cover any such business so they had to apply for a

similar usage. The attorneys for Door Dash are very excited about opening. Final approval was granted to Door Dash Essentials.

The Maypine Subdivision at 32700 White Road: There were two work sessions that followed that meeting. The developers appeared for the preliminary approval following one on one meetings between their engineer and **City Engineer DiFranco** to resolve drainage issues. A solution was reached in order to move forward with preliminary approval. There are still some issues for the builder to adhere to, but the project can now move forward.

During the Architectural Board of Review portion, there was approval for the following:

- Shed at 38460 Chimney Ridge
- (partial approval) Signage at Friends Church, 2846 SOM Center Road
- Rear addition and deck at 37500 Eagle Road
- New single family home at 29027 West Miller Road

Councilwoman Taylor Draper stated that during Public Portion of the PC-ABR Meeting, there was a resident upset that there was not paperwork available for the meeting. Routinely, that is not done but if anyone would like any of the information or paperwork it is readily available at City Hall.

Regarding a question posed at the previous night's District Meeting regarding the gas well at the Maypine Subdivision, **Councilwoman Taylor Draper** responded that it was the developer who suggested moving the driveway that goes toward the gas well.

Beautification Subcommittee (Audio: 1:03:20 - 1:06:07):

Councilwoman Belich reported that their main concern as of now is City Hall as well as the sign in front of City Hall. She stated that there hasn't been a Beautification Committee in some time so she, **Councilwoman Taylor Draper**, and **Councilwoman Miller** have taken it upon themselves to get something going without being a specific commission for now but can move toward that later. For now they have gathered information through conversations with the City's Service Department, Gale's Garden Center, **Finance Director Brichacek**, and **Mayor Gardner**. With limited resources, they plan to focus mainly on City Hall then eventually work toward other areas of the City. They plan to reach out beyond the three of them for additional help from residents, whether it be through a Commission, group, or garden club. **Councilwoman Miller** added that she had a good conversation with the owner of Gale's Garden Center about which plants are the best fit for their ideas. They plan to meet with the owner again in about a month.

Finance Committee Report by Council Vice President Kline:

No report.

Questions/comments following Committee Reports:

Councilwoman Taylor Draper asked **Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz** what role the Recreation Commission would take with the Rock and Roll Day. **Councilman Jarmuszkiewicz** responded that there have been meetings and talks of the Rec Commission being involved with the kids' games, but nothing concrete has been set yet.

Mayor Gardner asked **Councilwoman Taylor Draper** whose home on West Miller was approved and **Councilwoman Taylor Draper** responded that it was hers. She added that **Councilwoman Miller** sat in her place at the dais during that review and approved her home.

City Engineer DiFranco stated that there was a link added to the City's website for Planning Commission items. Now anyone can click the link to see the plans for items on the upcoming agendas. As far as resident

notification of projects, there is a requirement in the City Code (Subdivision Chapter) that for large subdivisions residents will be notified when they are up for preliminary approval. This was done for the Maypine Subdivision and will be done for the Conservation Subdivision on SOM Center when they are ready.
